1. Why Rewrite Prompts Matter for KDP Publishers

AI can help Kindle publishers draft faster, but it often creates writing that feels strangely polished and lifeless at the same time. The information may be useful, but the voice can sound generic. The chapter may be organized, but the rhythm can feel repetitive. The sentences may be grammatically correct, but the reading experience feels flat.
